ASK ARJAN

In the song "Fireflies" they state that they get a thousand hugs from 10.000 lightning bugs. Does each firefly hug 1000 times, or do only 1/10th of the bugs give you a hug?

Love at first sight is not love but a lush

I am very sorry to destroy the foundation of possibly one of your romantic concepts, love at first sight might not classify as love. A study by Zsok et al. (2017) from the University of Groningen suggests, that the experience of love at first sight is not love but just mere physical attraction and nothing more. Zsok argues that the experience described by most couples as love at first sight in retrospective does not resemble love, passion or intimacy but only with high attractiveness. But please, the next time you hear somebody talking about love at first sight, don't use this to destroy their lives.

Half of the population of Japanese town have PTSD symptoms

Although it is not really news, it is indeed a very interesting case. During the extraordinary earthquake in 2011, the city of Hirono in the Prefecture Fukushima was a victim of the earthquake itself, a tsunami, the nuclear accident in Okuma and relocation. Although only two casualties were reported, the town suffered heavily from those massive hits in such a short time. In a study published in 2014, it was reported that 53.5% of the participants from the town exhibited PTSD symptoms that are clinically concerning, 33.2% showed clinical symptoms. Roughly two thirds of the participants suffered from depression in different magnitudes. The situation got better, many of the citizens recovered by picking up work for the community in order to rebuild. But the process still continues.

HANDS UP FOR QUESTIONS

We asked Dimensie members for their stories of previous years. They told us all about why they became a member of Dimensie and what their fondest memories are.

Who are you and what are you doing at the moment in your studies?

I am Fenna Boerkamp, I am a third year student and I am currently doing my minor. I am following the module Professional Learning in Organizations from Educational Science and Technology and I hope to start this master next year. Besides that, I am a student mentor for first year students and a to-be student assistant for second year students. I originally come from Apeldoorn,





EVALUATING THE STUDY WITH...

Mathijs de Ruiter, Commissioner of Educational Affairs at Dimensie, provides a way for you to voice your complaints or ask your questions. He acts as a bridge between students and faculty members and can help you whenever you have a question about the educational program. But what does the Commissioner of Educational Affairs actually do? And in what ways does he have contact with the faculty? We interviewed him to get the answer to these and other questions!

Let's start with something simple; Can you shortly introduce yourself?

I'm Mathijs de Ruiter, I'm 22 years old, Dutch and I live close to Enschede. Since September I am a board member of Dimensie. Because this is a full-time function, I am currently a third year student but not in the third year of the study yet. If you have a lot of spare time, I can also tell you all about my hobbies. In short, I like cycling -such as BMX racing or road cycling- and other sports. Aside from that, I like wood crafting.

What are your tasks as the Commissioner of Educational Affairs?

As Commissioner Educational Affairs, I'm free to organize a diversity of events to evaluate the study program and to support the students during their study time. These events are not aimed at partying, but

more about the study itself. An example is the evaluation lunch I organized a few weeks ago, where students could anonymously fill in a questionnaire about the quality of the education.

Aside from that, I try to attend every staff meeting and meetings with students, such as panel meetings and focus groups. There I can gather information to improve or maintain the quality of the education. My function is to act as the bridge between the staff of Psychology and the students for everything concerning the education.

How do you act as a bridge between students and the staff of Psychology?

The communication lines are very short, I can just walk to the program director, coordinator or any of the study advisors. I also attend a lot of meetings, such as the staff meeting every other week. Here, the study advisors, study coordinator and the program director are present to discuss points that are important for the entire study program. I can ask them any questions, either from myself or from other students.

Which committees are you part of as Commissioner Educational Affairs? And what do you discuss during these meetings?

As mentioned before, I attend the staff meeting every other week. Aside from that, I'm usually present at the panel meetings. These meetings are organized by the study faculty and are meant for evaluating the current modules students are in. Another meeting specifically about the Psychology study is the OLC (Opleidingscommissie or Program Committee in English). During these meetings, 5 students represent the voices of the students from each year and 5 teachers – one per Master track – is present. The programme coordinator and director also attend these meetings.



I also attend meetings about the quality of education in all BMS studies, or even university-wide. Once per month, there is a meeting for all the Commissioners Educational Affairs of the UTwente. Here, we discuss points that are important for every student, such as books or study environment. Lastly, I also had a meeting with the dean (one of the most important persons of the BMS faculty) about how to better evaluate the contents of the study. One of the ways we're going to do this is by organizing a seminar day for all BMS students next year.



As Commissioner Educational Affairs, I'm free to organize a diversity of events to evaluate the study program and to support the students during their study time.

Last October, you (and other Commissioners Educational Affairs) organized the “Project BMS”. Can you explain what this was?

The Project BMS was an event organized with all Commissioners of Educational Affairs of the BMS faculty, together with the Coordinator of Quality Assurance. During this event, students could voice their opinion to the program director immediately. The topics were based on the results of the National Student Survey of last year. Because of this, it was specifically meant for students in their second or third year, or Master students because they filled in the NSS last year. The Project BMS was meant as a way to get more detailed reasoning for the scores on the NSS.

The most important topics that were discussed, were the study load and internationalization of the program, and a very positive point of the UT; the study environment. One of the issues we have looked into was the fact that the UT Psychology program scores lower overall, but higher on every specific part as compared to other Psychology studies in The Netherlands. Everyone was enthusiastic and the discussion was really interactive. With the results of the Project BMS, I made a factsheet presenting the main findings.

With what type of questions can students contact you? And in what ways can they reach you?

Students can contact me with any question regarding their education, and since I am also the Commissioner of External Affairs, I can help with career preparation (e.g. internships, vacancies and voluntary work options). BOOK REVIEWS


Let me tell you a Story – Jorge Bucay, 2002

Jorge Bucay is an author and psychotherapist from Buenos Aires. His books are translated to over 20 languages and sold millions of copies. The book "let me tell you a story" is about the young man Demian and his therapy. Demian has difficulties facing the problems of every day's life like his work, family and love life. His therapist, Jorge, approaches Demian's dilemmas in a very unconventional manner; In every session, he tells him a story. This book is just downright perfect. Every chapter includes one story. They all draw beautiful analogies to the problem Demian faces during his therapy which is also a therapy for the reader, because his problems are the ones everyone faces every now and then. Every single chapter leaves you with a smile and sometimes with a revelation of a solution to a problem you have yourself and the confidence to overcome a challenge. Although it is a much overused phrase in literature, this book can truly be a life changer. I can recommend and encourage reading this book simply to everyone, it is a real "must read". Also, at a price of around 10€, it is a perfect gift.




Dark Matter – Blake Crouch, 2016

"Are you happy with your life?"

These are the last words Jason Dessen is asked by his kidnapper right before getting knocked unconscious. Until that moment, the college physics teacher lived a happy life in Chicago together with his young family. He awakes in a strange setting surrounded

by strangers in hazmat suits who welcome him as a hero that has finally returned to the world, but he cannot remember any of it or the purpose of his mission. He begins to realize that an impossible idea can be the only explanation of his fate.




Dark Matter is ... different. Blake Crouch has written a thriller that not just sucks you in but also draws the attention to some dilemmas of modern philosophy. Jason's chase of his own world is a very interesting approach to the concept of an infinite multiverse with a major plot twist in the last act that reveals the sheer essence of unexpected consequences. Although the ending is not entirely surprising, it will still leave you blown away and will make you think. Crouch's style of writing is blunt, direct and compelling. It creates a story which is insanely fast moving and pauses at every event of the plot for exactly the right time. This is one of those books that you pick up and that you do not need a bookmark for. This novel is one of the best scientific thrillers I have read so far. I recommend this book to everyone that is into science fiction and open to abstract concepts. Theoretical physicists may probably hate it for its representation of the multiverse based on Schrödinger's thought experiments. But I don't care.

Carrie – Stephen King, 1974

And now a classic. Carrie is Stephen King's first published book and instantly earned him a reputation as a bestseller author. The book is about the 16 year old girl Carrietta White, only called Carrie from the little town Chamberlain. Carrie lives together with her fanatic mother, her father died in a work accident. Carrie is being bullied in school and is the scapegoat for almost everything. After one specific instance, where the plot sets, she discovers that she has telekinetic abilities. She begins to adapt herself, gets to know some people better and start to develop a normal life, away from her mother. Until all goes wrong and she releases utter mayhem on the city. Why did I spoiler the showdown? I didn't, the book itself does it. The main story is written as a flashback and the chapters are separated by evaluations of the incident in the form of police reports, interviews with survivors or scientific articles regarding telekinesis. Every single part of it leaves you with more knowledge about what happened, without giving you any details. It is a perfect used tool of keeping excitement high and even increasing it. The story is written in a direct language and does appear to be written in the 2000's. But the most distinctive tool is the use of thought. King writes the thoughts of his characters as they happen; between sentences and without punctuation. It is sometimes hard to read but gives you a deep understanding of the characters.
